

This map is presented in *color infrared* which is often used for interpretation of natural resources. In color infrared imagery, healthy and dense vegetation is seen in bright red, less dense and healthy vegetation is seen in lighter reds and pinks, and dead vegetation is seen in darker greens. Using this type of imagery better shows the burn scar (outlined in a thick black line) and the devastation caused by wildfires on the forests of Northern New Mexico.





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
