Noxious Weed Management Grant

The NMDA recently announced the Noxious Weed Management Grant Program. Competitive grants of up to \$60,000 will be awarded to eligible applicants (including cooperative weed management areas, local governments, state political subdivisions, tribes, acequias, NGOs, and others with proven land management capacity). Projects must include mapping or on-the-ground treatment. The online application opens on March 3rd and closes April 11th!
