Assistant Director, Ecological Restoration Institute (deadline: April 28)

Based in Flagstaff, AZ, at Northern AZ Univ., this leadership administration and management position will provide financial oversight and forecasting, personnel management and planning, event planning, staff travel and purchasing. This is a full-time position with benefits, starting at \$89,551 DOE.

NM Dept. of Agriculture (2 positions)

NMDA is seeking a <u>senior program manager</u> (deadline: May 1; salary: \$59,966 DOE) to progress a wide range of state priorities, e.g., climate policy, federal public land management, water resources, threatened and endangered species, soil and rangeland health, forestry and noxious weeds. Additionally, the <u>natural resources policy/planning analyst</u> (deadline: April 20; salary: \$53,166) will support the biological, economic, sociopolitical and legal aspects of NM's farming and ranching priorities. Both positions are full-time with benefits.

USFS Southwestern Region – Wildland Fire (deadline: April 24)

Summer 2025 permanent positions in wildland fire, including positions with the Carson National Forest (Taos, Bloomfield, Canjilon, El Rito, Peñasco, Questa, Tres Piedres) are now open for <u>Fire Management Officers</u> (GS12-13), <u>Fire Engine Operators</u> (GS6-7), <u>Prevention Technicians</u> (GS12), <u>Dispatchers</u> (GS8-9), <u>Wildland firefighters</u> (GS11), <u>Forestry Technicians</u> (GS5-7), <u>Hotshot/Handcrew</u> (GS4-5). All positions are open to the public and career transition applicants.

Forest Stewards Guild needs one more committed team member (aged 16-25 years) for their Coyote summer crew, June 2-August 1 (\$17 p/hour, CPR/First Aid, and opportunity to earn 2 college credits from SFCC). Positions with the Fall Fire & Fuels program will open soon.

>>> FUNDING OPPORTUNITIES:

In an era of how to do the work with diminishing funding resources, here are recently announced opportunities to boost/bridge funding for your work:

- NM Environmental Dept. is accepting proposals for the <u>FY2026 River Stewardship Program</u> to enhance the natural functioning of New Mexico's streams and rivers by providing state funding to plan, design, and construct projects that improve surface water quality or river habitat.
 - Who can apply: nonprofits, businesses, tribes and pueblos, SWCDs, municipalities, counties, local and state agencies. Deadline: May 20
- Fire-adapted Communities <u>microgrants</u> (up to \$2,000) for modest fuels reduction projects or wildlife preparedness events (deadline: May 2)

Hub of Resources for Collaborative Conservation in NM: Groups and individuals working in natural resource management, particularly collaborative conservation, can visit NMFWRI's newly launched NM Collaboration Hub (nmcollabhub.org) to connect, share knowledge, and work together.
